# Dignity Fund as legislation/law

1 [Charter Amendment - Dignity Fund]

2

3 **Describing and setting forth a proposal to the voters, at an election to be held on**

4 **November 8, 2016, to amend the Charter of the City and County of San Francisco to:**

5 **1) establish the Dignity Fund to support Seniors and Adults with Disabilities; 2) require an**

6 **annual contribution by the City to the Fund including an annual baseline amount of**

7 **\$38 million, increasing by \$6 million for fiscal year 2017-2018, and increasing by \$3 million**

8 **a year for the next 9 years until fiscal year 2026-2027, and continuing at that amount,**

9 **adjusted annually for changes in aggregate discretionary City revenues, for the next 10**

10 **years until fiscal year 2036-2037; 3) establish a planning process for expenditures from the**

11 **Fund; 4) create an Oversight and Advisory Committee; 5) set an expiration date of**

12 **June 30, 2037; and, 6) change the “Commission on Aging” to the “Aging and Adult**

13 **Services Commission” and update its responsibilities.**

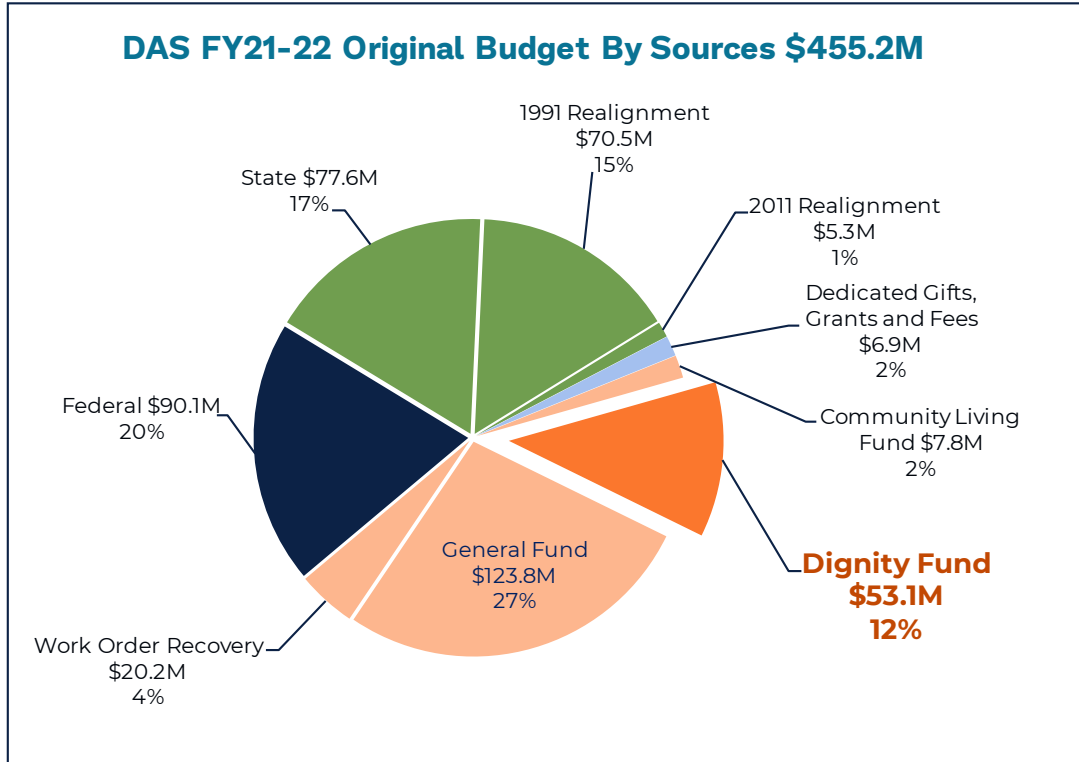
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- [Prop I passed by SF voters in Nov 2016](#) establishing the DF in SF’s admin code
- In addition to programmatic specifics, legislation outlines budgetary details
- Creates dedicated, annual funding – ongoing – outside the year-to-year fluctuation in City’s General Fund
- Mandates fixed dollar growth until FY 26-27 – see table below
- Spells out City deficit levels triggering a freeze in the Fund’s growth
- Specifies that DF savings/underspending shall remain with the Fund and carry forward into the next fiscal year

# Dignity Fund as revenue in the DAS budget



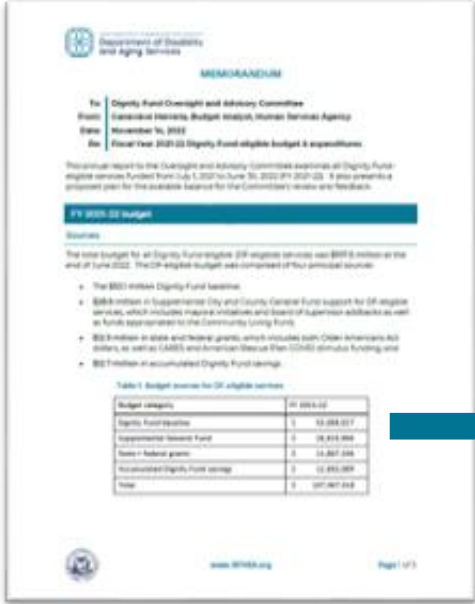

- DF as a revenue in the larger DAS budget
- DF only includes mandatory baseline transfer in this context
- DF baseline is 12% of the DAS budget
- Broader DF-eligible budget includes additional appropriation, plus savings

# Dignity Fund as part of a broader portfolio of funding

**Dignity Fund baseline = mandated base + growth**

**Dignity Fund-eligible = All dollars used to deliver DF-eligible services**
